Your Lourdes Sunday Liturgy at Home

18th Sunday in Ordinary Time August 2, 2020

"You who have no money, come, receive..." Isaiah 55:1

God does not desire hunger. Today's readings show us our God's compassion for those who hunger and thirst. Jesus makes those who have followed him his "companions" – a word which means "those with whom bread is shared." And God is inviting us to do the same: to share our bread and in so doing make the poor, and indeed every person, our companions on the way to that heavenly banquet. That's what Jesus asks the disciples to do in this week's Gospel, and after they had distributed the bread, an abundance was left over.

This miracle of feeding has echoes of the Eucharist. The four actions of the Eucharist are there: Jesus took the bread, blessed it, broke it and gave it to his disciples to distribute. How it all happens is mysterious, but it happens nonetheless.

In our reading from the book of the prophet Isaiah, God issues an urgent invitation to come:

- come to the water....
- come, receive grain and eat...
- come without price....
- come to me heedfully....

And this free banquet has rich food and drink. For many people in our world today, that vision seems far off. Ask the folks in Flint, Michigan and on the Navajo lands in the Southwest how impossible clean water sounds. Talk with the people in urban food deserts about living on a diet of junk food and cold cuts from the bodega. Speak with the poor of the world who endure droughts and famine or live on parched land downstream from a new dam. For them, "come to the water" is a pipedream.

In a sermon on the feeding of the vast crowd in a deserted place, the late Harvard University Chaplain Peter Gomes insisted that the message of this miracle is clear: It is not the will of God that people should go hungry (*Sermons: Biblical Wisdom For Daily Living*, William Morrow and Co., New York: 1998). This miracle is repeated six times in the four Gospels – the only miracle appearing in all of them:

- Mark 14:13-21 & 8:1-10
- Matthew 14:13-21 & 15:32-39
- Luke 9:10-17
- John 6:1-15

This feeding of the multitude attests to the fact that Jesus met people's real needs. He fed the hungry, said Gomes, not with metaphors but with food, not with resolutions and presidential commissions but with so much bread and fish that there was an abundance left over. Jesus met their physical needs in a generous manner so that, with their physical hunger satisfied, he could then address the hunger of their hearts. Through his action, Jesus acknowledged that there is a real connection between the hunger of the body and the hunger of the soul. Both the physical and spiritual needs of humankind are God's concern.

Jesus' action and his generosity were reminiscent of several similar events concerning food that are preserved in the Hebrew Scriptures. One of those is featured in today's first reading, where Deutero-Isaiah, speaking for God, invites the poor to come, eat, drink and be satisfied. Only after their physical hunger has been addressed does the Lord invite: "Come to me heedfully, listen, that you may have life. I will renew with you the everlasting covenant, the benefits assured to David." Not the least among those benefits was the promise of God's protective presence, forever.

Our Epistle today is a familiar passage from Letter to the Romans (8:35, 37-39) that families select frequently for funerals. Paul asks the question: "What will separate us from the love of Christ?" and lists a string of possibilities. And the answer is: "Nothing!"

³⁷ No, in all these things we conquer overwhelmingly through him who loved us.

³⁸ For I am convinced that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor present things, nor future things, nor powers,³⁹ nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Gospel – Matthew 14:13-21

¹³ When Jesus heard of the death of John the Baptist, he withdrew in a boat to a deserted place by himself. The crowds heard of this and followed him on foot from their towns.

¹⁴ When he disembarked and saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, and he cured their sick.

¹⁵ When it was evening, the disciples approached him and said, "This is a deserted place and it is already late; dismiss the crowds so that they can go to the villages and buy food for themselves."

¹⁶ Jesus said to them, "There is no need for them to go away; give them some food yourselves."

¹⁷ But they said to him, "Five loaves and two fish are all we have here." ¹⁸ Then he said, "Bring them here to me, "

¹⁹ and he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and the two fish, and looking up to heaven, he said the blessing, broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, who in turn gave them to the crowds.

²⁰ They all ate and were satisfied, and they picked up the fragments left over twelve wicker baskets full.²¹ Those who ate were about five thousand men, not counting women and children. The Gospel of the Lord.....Praise to you Lord Jesus Christ.

Reflection Prompts:

In our Gospel today, Jesus had just learned of John the Baptist's execution by King Herod, and he withdrew on a boat to a deserted place to pray. When he was spotted by "the vast crowd," Jesus could've said, "Go away, I'm busy praying." But instead, he was moved with pity for them and cured their sick. Ministry oft times happens in the interruptions, not by appointment – the inconvenient doorbell or the phone call can be transformed into a holy encounter.

- 1. Have you ever abandoned your plans and helped somebody?
- **2.** Meals have great importance in Scripture. Have you had such a Godly feast?
- **3.** How do our Eucharistic celebrations impel us to act for just global food distribution?

Meditation suggestion

Ask Jesus to share his compassionate heart with you. Imagine that the gift was received and envision yourself using that heart. Sit with that image for a few minutes. Then move into this week's intercessions.
