In early June, several Lourdes families hosted visitors from the L'Arche federation who were participating in their international conference at Agnes Scott College. L'Arche members joined us for Sunday mass and then returned on Friday afternoon for a lively presentation on our parish history. As Lourdes members Karen Allen and Charlotte Johnson described their involvement in the Civil Rights Movement, the visitors saw firsthand how our parish is animated by the same spirit that underlies their movement.

A SIGN THAT LOVE IS POSSIBLE

In 1964 a Canadian Catholic philosopher, Jean Vanier, became concerned about the plight of people institutionalized because of developmental disabilities. Inspired by a Dominican priest, Father Thomas Philippe, Vanier invited two of these men to share his household and live together in the spirit of the gospel. He called their home L'Arche (The Ark), after Noah's Ark. L'Arche today includes over 120 interfaith communities in 40 different countries. In these homes, people with cognitive disabilities (called "core members") live with volunteer "assistants" in a family environment based on sharing and mutual respect. As Jean Vanier wrote, "L'Arche is not a solution to a social problem, but a sign that love is possible, and that we are not condemned to live in a state of war and conflict where the strong crush the weak. Each person is unique, precious and sacred."

A BELOVED CHILD OF GOD

One such person was Adam Arnett, a severely handicapped L'Arche core member in Toronto. Arnett was assisted by Father Henri Nouwen, the popular spiritual writer who left his prestigious academic positions to join L'Arche. After Arnett's death, Father Nouwen reflected on their life together in a book called Adam: God's Beloved. "Adam," he wrote, "was a person, who by his very life announced the marvelous mystery of our God: I am precious, beloved, whole, and born of God. Adam bore silent witness to this mystery, which has nothing to do with whether or not he could speak, walk, or express himself, whether or not he made money, had a job, was fashionable, famous, married or single. It had to do with his being. He was and is a beloved child of God."

A NEW HOME IN THE ATLANTA AREA

This month, after years of planning, L'Arche is opening a new home in Decatur's Oakhurst neighborhood. Friends of L'Arche Atlanta is a group that has worked to facilitate the opening and welcomes prayers, support and volunteer assistance from anyone who wants to help "make known the gifts of people with intellectual disabilities, revealed through mutually transforming relationships."
