IS THIS THE NEW NORMAL?

In September, NBC launched The New Normal, a comedy series about a gay couple who use a surrogate mother to start a family. No doubt creators of the show recognized that surrogacy is an increasingly popular alternative for infertile couples and others unable to bear their own children. In the political season just past, in fact, Mitt Romney noted that four of his own grandchildren were actually carried by a surrogate.

Surrogate mothers are ordinarily paid for their services. Genetic surrogates bear children conceived through artificial insemination, while gestational surrogates carry embryos conceived in labs ("test tube babies"), but neither maintain an ongoing parental connection with their children after birth. As a New Normal character says, a surrogate mom is "just like an easy bake oven, except with no legal rights to the cupcake."

FEMINIST SUPPORT FOR A CONSERVATIVE VETO

For that very reason, the feminist National Organization for Women (NOW) recently gave a surprisingly strong endorsement to New Jersey Governor Chris Christie's veto of legislation that seemed to encourage gestational surrogacy. Christie opposed this "profound change in the traditional beginnings of the family," agreeing with feminist arguments that surrogacy arrangements treat mothers as if they were just incubators who carry babies for men while offering nothing of lasting value to their children.

TWO SIDES OF A SAD TRANSACTION

A November New York Times story, "Making Babies, Just to Make Ends Meet," recounts the experience of a middle-aged woman who has served as a surrogate for three different couples. Her most recent baby went to a wealthy older couple, and she carried an ice chest with her to the hospital because, as she explained, "They bought the milk, too." Though her last pregnancy left her "green eyes shimmering with pain and worry," she is debating whether to rent her womb once again because she badly wants a decent house for her own family and thinks, "It's the only way to get a down payment."

"How do you think we feel about being created specifically to be given away?" asks a teen named Brian in a blog he created to discuss being a product of such a surrogate arrangement. "You can dress it up in as many pretty words as you want," but, he insists, "It looks to me like I was bought and sold." Even though sometimes it "doesn't show up until we're in our teens or young adults," he concludes, "nothing can console us."

"BABIES ARE NOT COMMODITIES"

Catholic teaching supports Brian's point: "Babies are not commodities. Babies are human beings." Catholics believe that no one has a "right to a child," but every child has the right to be born "of one father and one mother who are father and mother both from a biological and a legal point of view." Yet we also recognize the hardships of infertility. which is often keenly felt during the Christmas season. That's why our bishops urge compassion for childless couples and endorse "methods for treating the infertile couple with full respect for the dignity of the spouses and for the life to be born."
