


Marking her 100th birthday, centenarian Emily Milner, the oldest living alumna of Our Lady of Lourdes School, recalled her encounters with Mother Katharine Drexel, the foundress of our parish. "She was in a wheelchair then. She was a saint while she was living," said Miss Emily.

An active woman who had worked tirelessly to serve Americans on the margins of society, Katharine Drexel experienced a debilitating heart attack at age 77. She spent the next 18 years of her life in confinement, yet she never surrendered to self-pity. Instead, she called her years of suffering her "highest work." Even in pain, noted Emily Milner, "she was a beautiful lady."

WHAT VALUE COULD THERE BE IN SUFFERING?

Saint Katharine Drexel's final years may seem incomprehensible to many people today. In Western countries where suffering only occasionally interrupts otherwise comfortable lives, people who fear prolonged physical or psychological distress may even turn to medical assistance to end their lives. In the Netherlands, where assisted suicide accounts for at least 5% of all deaths, politicians have proposed allowing doctors to kill people 75 years of age or older, no matter the current state of their health, if they believe their lives are "completed."

What value could there be in lengthy suffering? As we celebrate the Easter mysteries. Christians recall St. Paul's words, "In my flesh I am filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ." In fact, "Christ's sacrifice is sufficient," explains Catholic commentator Mark Shea, "but since he has made us participants in that sacrifice, our acts of sacrifice matter too."

"From a practical and utilitarian viewpoint," Shea writes, "a bedridden victim of some disease appears to have 'nothing to offer.' But then, so did Jesus when he hung on the cross and, to utilitarian eyes, accomplished nothing useful for six hours. In fact, of course, he accomplished the redemption of the world. A suffering soul likewise can join his or her sufferings to Jesus and, in his mysterious exchange of love, do great and wonderful things for others."

OUR GOD SUFFERS WITH US

In the Eucharist, as Pope Francis recently noted, "the lives of the faithful, their suffering, their prayer, their work, are united to those of Christ and to his total offering, and in this way they take on a new value." Attending daily mass in her sickroom, St. Katharine Drexel recognized that bearing our own cross may finally mean accepting the suffering that often accompanies old age and death. Like Katharine Drexel, Catholics believe that in times of intense suffering on our own crosses, our compassionate God is intensely close to us, feeling our pain and sharing our suffering, giving us the chance to do our "highest work" as our lives on earth draw to a close.
